

### A. Introduction and Background

- 1. During the First Joint Mission held July 20-22, 2011 it was jointly agreed with the Government of the Commonwealth of Dominica (Government), that the World Bank will support the Ministry of Environment, Natural Resources, Physical Planning and Fisheries in preparing the Dominica Strategic Program for Climate Resilience (SPCR). It was also agreed that the World Bank would procure, on behalf of the Government, a team of consultants to assist with the SPCR preparatory process in close collaboration with relevant ministries/agencies of the Government to ensure the process is aligned and builds upon national strategic plans and priorities.
- The preparation of Dominica's SPCR and related investment plan has involved a comprehensive country-2. driven process. SPCR preparation was initiated with an exhaustive desk-top study of existing national and regional climate change and development policies, plans and programs, including, inter alia, the Initial and Second National Communications to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC), Dominica's Climate Change Adaptation Policy and Action Plan (2002), the Special Program for Adaptation to Climate Change (SPACC), the Sustainable Land Management (SLM) Project, and the Organization for Eastern Caribbean States (OECS), Saint George's Declaration (SGD) - Principles for Environmental Sustainability (2006). This exercise also included a review of resource-specific climate change risks identified in Dominica's Biodiversity Strategy and Action Plan, and a comprehensive review of Dominica's Climate Change Adaptation Policy and Action Plan (2002). The SPCR preparation process also included: 1) national consultations, assessments by sector technical working groups<sup>1</sup>, meetings with small focus group and one-on-one meetings held with key national stakeholders, policy makers, civil society including the private sector and prospective beneficiaries about the pilot program, to confirm the strategic focus of the SPCR; 2) an in-depth assessment of climate change impacts and risks; 3) adaptation capacity assessments at the national, sectoral and community levels; 4) the identification of priority interventions; and 5) a cost benefit analysis for potential SPCR public and private sector interventions. Additionally, there was a thorough stock-taking of relevant past, planned and ongoing climate change adaptation projects by the Government, Multi-lateral Development Banks (MDBs), development partners, the private sector and Civil Society (NGOs / CBOs) to ensure the coordination and added value of activities.
- 3. In addition to the First Joint Mission, a PPCR National Consultative Workshop was conducted in December 2011. The objectives of the National Consultative Workshop were to: 1) undertake the climate change risk assessment through a stakeholder evaluation of priority climate change risks and capacity constraints identified by sector technical working groups; 2) facilitate stakeholder identification of viable interventions to address sectoral priority risks and capacity constraints; 3) obtain feedback from consultations with vulnerable communities and facilitate discussions on priority intervention to address community needs; 4) facilitate report

back on the findings of the National Adaptive Capacity Assessment and stakeholder evaluation of priority capacity needs; and 5) facilitate stakeholder ranking/rationalizing priority risks and needs.

4. The draft Low-Carbon Climate-Resilient Development Strategy, which included an outline of the SPCR proposed activities to be funded under the PPCR and proposed budget allocations, was circulated to the Joint Mission on March 13<sup>th</sup>, 2012.

### **B.** Mission Objectives

- 5. The Second Joint Mission was held on March 21-23, 2012, with the intention of achieving the following objectives:
  - review the draft outline of the SPCR and Investment Plan and provide recommendations;
  - discuss the likely impacts of the proposed projects on the main beneficiaries, the implementing agencies and cost and justification for those projects, and to provide recommendations;
  - agree in principle on the components of the financial program;
  - identify with international development partners, possible areas of collaboration, synergy and linkages
    with current and proposed multi-lateral and bi-lateral climate change, food security, renewable energy,
    greenhouse gas reduction, and disaster risk management programs, all geared towards a sustainable and
    competitive growth model for Dominica,
  - evaluate approach to including climate change into the national development agenda and provide recommendations;
  - identify the way forward /next steps;
  - Ensure the linkages and synergies between Dominica's National PPCR and the Caribbean Regional Track
    of the PPCR.
- 6. The Second Joint Mission team comprised the World Bank<sup>23</sup>; and the Inter-American Development Bank<sup>4</sup>. Donor partners, civil society and regional institutions were represented by Caribbean Development Bank, United Nations Development Program, United Nations Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean, Pan American Health Organization, Caribbean Community Climate Change Centre, Caribbean Environmental Health Institute, Japanese International Cooperation Agency, Caribbean Environmental Health Institute, University of the West Indies, Carib Save and Organization of American States (Please see annex 1 for a complete list of participants).
- 7. The Second Joint Mission was held at Fort Young Hotel, in Roseau Dominica, and chaired by the Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Environment, Natural Resources, Physical Planning and Fisheries, Mr. Samuel Carrette. The Dominica National PPCR Team Lead Consultant, Mr. George de Romilly and the PPCR National Coordinator, Mr. Collin Guiste jointly facilitated the round table discussions and the various break-out sessions that took place during the course of the Second Joint Mission. The Director of the ECU, Mr. Lloyd Pascal and the Dominica National PPCR Team Lead Consultant provided an overview of Dominica's Low-Carbon Climate-resilient Development Strategy, which is the over-arching framework designed to strategically channel all donor climate change adaptation interventions including Dominica's SPCR. The investments and technical assistance components in the SPCR were presented to the national ministries, international partners, regional agencies, and civil service that were present during the Second Joint Mission. A list of participants can be referenced in Annex 1.

During the final day of the Second Joint Mission, an open forum discussion on gender, vulnerable communities and climate change was convened. This session was initiated by a short presentation by Mrs. Lolell Williams, representing the Kalinago People and Dominica National Council of Women. During her presentation, Mrs. Williams highlighted that the Kalinagos (First Nations' people of Dominica) are struggling for survival, having lost their language, their religious practices and constantly battling to maintain their traditions, customs and identity. With limited resources at their disposal to respond, and with their traditional resilient culture under threat, the Kalinago consider climate change to be an overwhelming phenomenon. Its effects are numerous with far reaching consequences. Kalinago women will be the ones affected most by climate change given their roles in the family. Being the care-givers, food producers and the leaders in family management, Kaliango women play a significant role in the development of the family. Climate change will cause interruption to planting and harvesting cycles which will affect womens' livelihood, thus putting the household and food security at risk and pushing them into greater poverty. Because of droughts, resulting in the lack of water for irrigation purposes, there will be a decrease in vegetable production. The social life and family structure will also be affected as the menlhusbands will have to seek employment elsewhere to maintain their family, leaving the mothers and wives alone to care for the children. Kalinago women will have to work harder, restless, and suffer from fatigue, thus increasing stress levels which will consequently affect health. Climate change will also impact on the culture and traditions of the Kalinago community. Food shortage will cause families to divert from their traditional habits and depend on imported food. There will be a dwindling of basket weaving and craft production since there may not be sufficient raw materials to continue this tradition. Traditional herbal gardens will be affected since there will not be enough water to irrigate the plants during drought events, or too much water during events of heavy rainfall causing disease and damage. Participants during the open forum session evaluated the merits of proposed SPCR interventions that target women and vulnerable segments of society, reaching the conclusion that the provision of early warning systems, community emergency shelters, access to micro-finance and micro-insurance, and community training in climate change risk mapping and management would provide a suit of measures that would measurable reduce vulnerability amongst such segments of society.

8. Conclusions of the mission and this Aide Memoire/Second Joint Mission Report were discussed in a wrap-up meeting with the representatives of the Government of Dominica and the ECU at the end of the Second Joint Mission. The key findings of the mission are summarized below.

### C. Key Mission Outcomes

9. The Government confirmed that an Investment Plan will be presented as part of its SPCR, requesting US\$7 million in grants<sup>5</sup>. Additionally, the Government will request the total concessional loans of US\$9 million<sup>6</sup>, this language, in regards to the grant and loan allocation, will be included in the SPCR document that Dominica will submit to the PPCR Sub-Committee for endorsement. The grant and loan allocation will support the Government's efforts to move towards a climate resilient development pathway in line with Dominica's Low-Carbon Climate-resilient Development Strategy and the components outlined in their SPCR. However, the Government and people of Dominica incur an increasingly heavy financial burden to address costs associated with climate change and climate variability, which in 2011 amounted to a sum in excess of US\$100 million for damages from extreme weather events that are increasing in frequency and intensity. These re-occurring and ever growing costs which are being borne by government, private sector and civil society constitute a severe impediment to the economic, social and environmental development aspirations of the country, and detract much needed funding from Dominica's development and poverty alleviation programs. The Government would like to

state that the available PPCR grant envelope is insufficient to implement priority measures that are urgently needed to address current exposure to climate change risks, and would therefore welcome additional funding, particularly grant funding, from the CIF, if funds were to become available.

- 10. The implementation of PPCR resources in Dominica will be led by the Ministry of Finance in close collaboration with the Ministry of Environment, Natural Resources, Physical Planning and Fisheries. In order to meet World Bank fiduciary requirements, a Project Implementation Unit (Pill) will be procured and housed within the Ministry of Finance to take the lead on the preparation and implementation of PPCR investments. The Ministry of Finance, in close collaboration with the Ministry of Environment, Natural Resources, Physical Planning and Fisheries will be responsible for overall coordination of SPCR implementation across Government, and for overall PPCR monitoring and oversight.
- 11. The key approach adopted in developing the SPCR and related Investment Plan is based on the linkage to existing national development plans and programs addressing issues of climate change (principally the *Growth and Social Protection Strategy* (GSPS), and the successful engagement and participation from a wide range of experts from various ministries as well as from the private sector and the civil community. It is expected that at the end of implementation of Phase 2, Dominica will be able to more strategically, and measurably, begin to reduce climate vulnerability across different sectors, a process that has commenced with the formulation of Dominica's Low Carbon Climate Resilient Development Strategy which has been developed under the PPCR Phase 1 process.
- 12. Key national stakeholders, the MDBs and development partners endorsed the following three mutually benefiting components (programmatic areas) outlined in the draft SPCR, which represent the SPCRs strategic program areas and key actions:
- 1) Promotion of Food Security through Climate Resilient Agricultural/Fisheries Development. (partly supported through parallel financing from the Adaptation Fund): The objective of this component is to build climate resilient communities by strengthening capacity to address climate change risks to food security associated with changing precipitation patterns. Key activities include: formulation of Water Resource Inventory (surface and ground water resources); design/installation of hydro-met and coastal monitoring stations (including for automatic hydro-met and coastal monitoring equipment) to support establishment of community early-warning systems development (see Component 3); Establishment of food security program (to be scaled up and replicated with support under Adaptation Fund) involving design and construction of a pilot rain-fed organic greenhouse, drip irrigation, and organic food processing/storage facility utilizing renewable energy sources to determine technical and financial viability, and community-based pilot transplanting and restocking of climate resilient corals to determine technical and :financial viability in Dominica with a view to replication in other critical coral reef areas.
- 2) Comprehensive Risk Management Framework and Sustainable Climate Change Financing. The objective of this component is to establish the enabling institutional framework to coordinate climate change resilience programs and support key capacity building needs. Activities include: legal establishment within the Govt of Dominica of an agency responsible for coordinating climate change programming (including SPCR implementation); design and implementation of climate change adaptation and disaster risk management education and awareness program at all levels to be coordinated by the Ministry of Environment, Natural Resources, Physical Planning and Fisheries; community vulnerability mapping and adaptation planning undertaken for all Dominica; legal establishment of Climate Change Trust Fund in addition to provision of seed funding to the Climate Change Trust Fund to provide support to priority community climate change risks management measures identified through community vulnerability mapping and adaptation planning; establishment of micro-finance and micro-insurance for private sector and other vulnerable segments of society (farmers, fisherfolk, vulnerable communities in particular the Kalinago people, women, youth, elderly, disabled, sick and marginalize); and establishment of climate change adaptation standards for the private sector.

### 3) Enhancing Ecosystems/Infrastructure Resilience and Promotion of Sustainable Human Settlements.

The objective of this component is to establish the enabling environment whereby government, households and individuals assume the lead role in building resilient communities by addressing climate change risks to critical infrastructure. Activities include: establishment of community early warning systems based on real-time hydromet data under Component 1 (i); design, retrofitting/construction of at least three pilot multi-use climate resilient and energy efficient emergency shelters- to serve as basis for building emergency multi-use shelters funded under IDA, Regional IDA and possibly IBRD loans; design and implementation of a climate change risk management training program for Ministry of Public Works staff to climate proof the design and construction of critical infrastructure including roads - with infrastructure climate proofing to be funded under IDA, Regional IDA and possibly IBRD loans; climate proofing the design and construction of critical infrastructure.

- 13. Component 3 (Enhancing Ecosystems/Infrastructure Resilience and Promotion of Sustainable Human Settlements), which comprises major investments proposed, includes the following three subcomponents:
  - A) *Identification of vulnerable infrastructure* This includes an evaluation of technical solutions to address climate change risks, improve and enforce climate proofed building codes and develop effective monitoring capability to build climate proof structures in the construction industry;
  - F) Climate proofing of critical infrastructure, improving access to markets and building climate resilient communities This includes among other activities; construction of river defenses, slope stabilization, retrofitting of primary and secondary roads and bridges, improved processing and storage of agricultural/fisheries products as well as improved access to markets, construction of multi-purpose emergency shelters and early warning systems, implementation and enforcement of environmental protection legislation and building codes;
  - C) Establishment of Integrated Resource Management Framework This includes among other activities; land use zoning plans/land management plans, improve and implement climate proof building codes and effective monitoring capacity, soil erosion reduction by wind breaks, enhance protection of river banks, water catchment areas and protected areas.
- 14. The Government has approached the World Bank to provide assistance in the preparation of their investment plan, which will include activities identified in Component 1 and 3 of the SPCR. The Government of Dominica stated that they would prefer to manage the entire investment plan; however, is considering the option of, if possible under CIF institutional arrangements, Component 2 to be implemented by the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) offices in Barbados through their OECS Environment and Sustainable Development Unit. The operational and financial modality for this arrangement is still being explored. The Government will be informed once there is clarity from both the World Bank and the UNDP on how this arrangement will be operationalized in order to make an informed decision.

### D. Next Steps

17. PPCR SPCR will be submitted to the Climate Investment Funds PPCR Steering Committee by April 10, 2012 in order to be presented at the PPCR Sub-Committee Meeting to be held in Washington DC on April 30, 2012. It was confirmed by the Bank that the IDA-funded envelope available for the project will be US\$17.5 million, with the availability of additional Regional IDA of up to US\$5-6 million. For the PPCR-funded portion of the project and subject to the level of available funding, the Government indicated they will request US\$16 million (US\$7m in PPCR grants and US\$9 million in highly concessional financing) from the PPCR.
